




Background Information about the Museum





This museum started as a hobby that began in the fall of 1986 after attending the Ohio State Trappers Fall Convention in Mansfield, Ohio. Having been raised in Mansfield and already owning a few Newhouse traps of my own, I decided to check it out.

I had always loved trapping, even from a young age, and thought I knew a lot about traps, but I never would have guessed that people were willing to pay top dollar for my No. 81 Newhouse traps that I brought to the convention. From that day on I have been "hooked" on collecting traps and researching their history.

My wife, Jane and I were married in 1963 and lived in Galloway (near Columbus) until her untimely death in 2012 (we were married 49 years). During these earlier years, I was a Fire-fighter/Paramedic with the City of Upper Arlington and took early retirement in 1981. My collection started by filling several rooms in our home. Jane and I had a Medical Supply business and we built a large office/warehouse complex on the property. By the year 2000 we had started to downsize, making the lower level of the building available for my expanding collection. Jane was more than pleased to have me move the collection to this area and out of the house!


I have also been involved with the North American Trap Collectors Association (NATCA), serving as its president since 1991. In 2003 NATCA started a non-profit entity called "North American Trap Collectors Museum Inc." (NATCM Inc.), which is also housed at my museum. On behalf of the NATCM Inc., we contacted the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission in Harrisburg, PA. about the traps that the late Richard Gerstell had donated to them. Richard Gerstell wrote the book titled "The Steel Trap in North America". We asked if we could get a few of them on loan to display in the museum. They were willing to loan our Association 189 of Gerstell's finest and most rare traps, of which we have on display in the museum. This is all part of the NATCM Inc. collection, along with 320 traps and related paper items that members have donated to the NATCM Inc.

All in all, my personal collection consists of over 5000 traps, from mouse to bear size, early magazines, catalogs and printed material, tools used in the fur trade, and a vast variety of other related items.




MOUSE & RAT TRAP ROOM
